These skills are tremendously important when it comes to shaping multicultural communities that foster participation, freedom of speech, empowerment and international understanding.

The Landesgymnasium für Hochbegabte, located in the OSTSTADT, is the perfect venue for hosting the preliminary rounds of the 28th tournament.

The school is well-known for being open-minded, international, knowledge-hungry and for enriching our community.

It is a reliable partner, participating in community life, supporting local events and founding social initiatives.
